The Virginia Master Naturalist program is a statewide corps of trained volunteers providing education, science, and stewardship to benefit natural resource conservation in their communities. The Riverine Chapter is active in Richmond, Henrico County, and surrounding areas.

2023 Activity Highlights

Volunteers assisted Richmond Parks & Recreation with study and restoration of Dell Meadow Pond in Byrd Park. They conducted weekly water monitoring, documented species observations, developed a planting plan, and installed native plants to improve the habitat.

Volunteers participated in all steps of oyster reef restoration--collecting, transporting, and bagging waste shell, broadcasting oyster larvae onto it, and distributing it at oyster grounds in the Piankatank River. In 2023, this project introduced ~7 million spat on shell to the river.
